Here come the boys!

A significant milestone was reached by Wilmslow Prep this year as we welcomed our first three boys to the School's Kindergarten after 52 years as an all-girls school. Wilmslow Prep first opened its doors in 1909. At this time the School was mixed and it was only in 1961 that we became all-girls.

The new boys joined us 'early' following the announcement that, from September, we will begin to introduce boys, initially beginning with Kindergarten, Reception and Form I.

The School remains committed to the benefits of single sex education however, and boys and girls will be taught separately for the key core subjects from Form 3 onwards, allowing our teaching staff to prepare them for the next stage of their academic career – entrance to Senior School.

Headmaster Mr Paul Reynolds commented, "It goes without saying that we will remain a small, family centred School where the focus is on the needs of each individual child.



"This is a very exciting time for us as a School and it is wonderful that our parents have welcomed this change so readily. We are pleased to be able to offer parents with boys and girls the opportunity to have them at one school, receiving the same outstanding level of education.

"We strongly believe that the introduction of boys will enable WPS to exceed the needs of our parents, whilst also allowing us to continue to excel in delivering an outstanding education to our pupils in a unique and exceptional school environment."









Clean sweep for Form 6

Our talented Form 6 girls have celebrated another year of outstanding results, breaking all previous records by achieving an exceptional 100% success rate. The class of thirteen girls achieved a remarkable 35 offers from some of the North West's top independent schools, including five Music Scholarships, one Sports Scholarship and an Academic Scholarship.

Mr Reynolds praised the accomplishments of the girls, saying, "We are all immensely proud of our Form 6 girls who have continued the WPS tradition of exceptional exam results. The girls' success bears testament both to their own hard work and dedication and to that of all their teachers during their time at WPS. Particular thanks goes to the Forms 6 and 5 teachers, Mrs Judy Hughes and Miss Sarah Ramsay.

"Throughout their time at the School, the girls have developed into well rounded, proficient and independent young women. Not only are they exceptionally academically capable, but they are also talented in many other fields including art, drama and, of course, music and sport."



House System

The new school year saw Mme Ward step in and give the House system a radical new lease of life. The girls now have far more opportunities to support their House than before.



Pupils are now given coloured counters as rewards for their achievements. For example, a counter is awarded if they achieve 'Star of the Week', if they are awarded a merit or courtesy badge, or if they fill one of the Lunchtime Supervisors' new behaviour reward cards with stickers.

The counters are then placed into special containers in the entrance hall, allowing the girls to clearly see how well their House is performing.

Out and about



Venturing beyond the School gate to explore some of the fantastic places of interest on our doorstep is a great way to enhance the core curriculum. Here's a whistle-stop tour of this year's trips.

Great Outdoors



The WPS girls have spent lots of time exploring the local countryside this year. In October Form 4 pulled on their wellies and raincoats for a slightly soggy day out at Macclesfield Forest. Despite the rain the girls had a fantastic time touring the reservoirs and river dipping for freshwater shrimps.

In May, Form 3's lessons on the environment and habitats were supported by a trip to Alderley Edge Woods. Wellies were once more a necessity as the girls were shown around by a National Trust Ranger who taught them how to look for animal homes.

Hands (and feet) on learning

In November, the Kindergarten pupils took their learning out of the play shoe shop in their classroom and into the real world on a trip to Clarks in Wilmslow. The children were given the chance to explore the shop and ask lots of questions about the sales assistants' jobs. What started out as imaginative role-play became an opportunity to learn about size, counting, matching pairs and measuring in a fun and stimulating way.



The Kindergarten class weren't the only ones to step into someone else's shoes this year. Form 3 brought their history lessons to life when they took a trip to the Manchester Museum. They became archaeologists for the day and were shown some amazing artefacts, including real-life mummies.

Form 5 fully immersed themselves in their history topic, taking on the roles of Tudor servants on a visit to Tatton Old Hall.

Attired in long dresses and aprons, they tried their hand at some of the typical daily tasks expected of a servant, before being allowed to experiment with bows and arrows and other Tudor weaponry.

February saw Form 4 venture back to the Viking times for three days when they visited York. The girls enjoyed a variety of excursions including the Jorvik Viking Centre, the Railway Museum and DIG, where they took part in an archaeological excavation.

In May, Forms I & 2 visited Dunham Massey where they became housemaids to Lady Stamford. As part of their training they learnt to make beds, bake gingerbread men, empty chamber pots and polish silver.



Arts Trips

Form 5 started the year in fine voice and attended a special Music Workshop at Clonter Opera near Congleton. A variety of activities associated with the theatre were on offer and the girls were even able to design and build a set model. In the afternoon they were also treated to a stunning performance given by five professional opera singers.



After working hard for their Senior School entrance exams, Form 6, along with the girls from Form 5, were rewarded with a trip to the Lowry Theatre to watch Shakespeare 4 Kidz perform 'The Tempest.' Jessica B from Form 5 reported, "We got a real taste of Shakespeare's work. The story and plot were put in a way that was easy to follow."

Voyage en Normandie

Forms 5 & 6 packed their bags in May and headed to Ebblinghem, Normandy, for a week-long residential trip. The girls were able to put their language skills into practice as they experienced life in France. During their stay they visited a goat farm, tasted samples and bought souvenirs from a chocolaterie, and even had a snail eating competition!

The twenty-eight girls, who were accompanied by Mrs Hughes, Miss Ramsay, Mrs Broome and Mr Reynolds, returned thoroughly exhausted but with lots of new phrases and endless exciting stories to tell their families.

In November the School was hit by Pudsey fever and the girls adorned their uniforms with polka dot accessories in aid of Children in Need. The School Council sold fundraising Pudsey wristbands to the Junior girls and organised a whole-School Pudsey Portrait Competition and managed to raise over £130.

Festive Fundraising

The Christmas festivities at WPS were launched in late November by our annual Advent Toy Service which encourages the girls to think about children who may not be as fortunate as they are. Each of the pupils donated a toy at the assembly and their generous gifts were divided between children's charity Barnardo's and the Seashell Trust.

Our festive charity theme was continued when at the end of term the whole School dusted off their flashing noses, donned their antlers and took to the streets of Wilmslow town centre on a Reindeer Ramble in aid of



East Cheshire Hospice. As they walked, the girls sang Christmas songs, not only raising festive cheer but also over £2000 in sponsorship.

This year's Ramble was made extra-special by Georgina from Form 4 who contacted Radio 2's Chris Evans to tell him all about what the School was doing and who we were raising money for.



The festivities did not end when the antlers were hung up, however, as Form 4 headed over to Canterbury Grange sheltered accommodation where they entertained residents with renditions of popular Christmas songs.

We were delighted to be able to present Verna Costello from East Cheshire Hospice with a cheque for over £2000 when she came into assembly at the beginning of January.

In March the WPS pupils were even more full of fun than usual as they embraced the Comic Relief cause. A World Book Day Bring and Buy Book Sale kicked off the merriment and was swiftly followed by a cake sale held by Vanessa and Helena (F5), not to mention Yasmin (F5), Caitlin, Deià and Lauren (F6), who sold an incredible number of red noses and jokes in the week running up to the main event.

When the big day finally arrived, the whole School was transported back to the '80s as pupils and staff dressed up in their best legwarmers, brightest tutus and wackiest hairdos. We were still chuckling at the hilarious jokes from the competition held during assembly as we totted up the money raised by the girls, which amounted to over £300.

Our annual Harvest Festival assembly was extremely successful thanks to the girls' generous donations of food bags to be distributed amongst Manchester's homeless by Lifeshare. The Form 6 girls also made up harvest baskets to be donated to local elderly residents.

In October our non-uniform day raised £139 for Over the Wall, a children's charity who provide life-changing experiences to children and young people who are affected by serious and life limiting illnesses. More recently the girls have raised £329.06 by collecting spare change in their Barnardo's Change Boxes.

House Music Festival

In March we were treated to a staggering 22 performances from the Infants and 73 performances from girls in Forms 3-6 at our annual House Music Festival. Mrs Lucy Nattrass, who joined us as special guest, was overwhelmed by the quality of the performances and the number of girls who took part.

Each girl was awarded house points for their fantastic efforts and competition was hot for first place right up to the final note. It was a close race, but in the end Moreton were pipped at the post by Tatton who squeezed ahead by two points to become the overall winners.

The girls in Form 5 and 6 achieved a fantastic set of English Speaking Board (ESB) results in April, with an extremely high percentage achieving distinction.

The second half of the Summer Term saw a flurry of activity in Speech and Drama. In June Mrs Clark was very busy preparing the girls for their Forms 2-4 ESB Exams. The results were, again, exceptional and a fitting reward for all the hard work the girls and their teachers put into preparing for the exams.

During June some of our Forms 3-6 girls travelled to Altrincham Prep School for the annual Triangular Reading Competition and Anna Jerkku won the Form 3 Cup. Mille, Jessica B and Maui also spoke on 'The science of happiness' in the Rotary Youth Speaks Competition, a competition that we hosted this year for eight Junior and Primary Schools. Maui won the best Vote of Thanks category, a wonderful achievement.

At the beginning of the school year, Form 6 opened their netball season by taking on Pownall in the first outside match since the playground renovations took place. As it was

the first match of the season, each of the girls was given a chance to take a position. The girls all played exceptionally well, resulting in a well-earned 12-3 victory for WPS.

For the second year running, June's ISA Wigan NW Athletics Championships were hosted by WPS. The event was expertly organised by Mrs Broome and Miss McBride, with Mr Reynolds entertaining everybody in the stadium with his commentary!

It was a large turnout, with over 20 schools and 500 athletes taking part on a beautiful summer's day. It was well attended by our parents and the girls really enjoyed savoring the unique atmosphere of such a big occasion.

Of particular note were Halle B who came first in the UII High Jump and qualified for the Nationals in Birmingham, Jessica B who came third in the UII 150m and India P who came third in the UI0 Long Jump.

Inter-house Sports

Over two weeks in March the Form 5 & 6 girls competed in inter-house sports tournaments which tested their netball and hockey skills.

The girls demonstrated fantastic talent in the House Netball Tournament which ended up as a very close competition. In joint 3rd place were Gawsworth and Capesthorne. In 2nd place, scoring 11 points, was Tatton, and the overall winning team was Moreton with 15 points.

The House Hockey Tournament saw a similarly impressive standard of competition. In 4th place with 5 points was Gawsworth, in 3rd place with 7 points was Tatton and in second place with 9 points was Capesthorne. The winner, with 15 points, was Moreton.
