During the year we've had sporting success and recognition for the girls' Art, Speech and Drama. Music remains an integral part of School life and the girls have wowed us with their musical accomplishments.

As usual we have welcomed many visitors through our doors including authors, Alumni, many of the girls' grandparents and, latterly, School Inspectors!

The School itself has received the glowing endorsement of its parent body. In December we commissioned an independent survey which placed the School second highest nationally for levels of overall parent satisfaction.

In addition to the outstanding levels of satisfaction, 93% of parents said they would recommend the School to others. Other highlights of the survey included the School's strong relationships with parents, high praise for pupils' behaviour and manners, along with teachers' ability to inspire.

In 2007 the School received an outstanding inspection report and in June an Interim Inspection, was carried out by ISI. The results

Out and about



The Wilmslow Prep Girls have been very busy this year with a variety of interesting day visits and exciting residential trips, giving them the opportunity to continue their lessons outside the classroom. As ever the girls have learnt a lot from these experiences and have returned with increased enthusiasm for their learning.



Trip to Jodrell Bank

Back in September the Early Years' children had a fantastic day out at Jodrell Bank Observatory and Arboretum. In the morning the girls thoroughly enjoyed becoming nature detectives, learning about autumn and why the trees change colour. In the afternoon they changed into astronauts and by way of the 3D cinema travelled to Mars and back: all in a day's work!

Museum Minds

Following their studies on 'Ancient Egypt', Form 3's trip to Manchester Museum in October allowed the girls to get hands on with some of the ancient artefacts they had been learning about in class and up close and personal with Egyptian mummies. Forms 1 and 2 extended their science in November with their trip to the Science Museum, where they explored pushing and pulling forces by engaging in practical experiments using magnets and miniature cars.

Macclesfield Forest

Form 4 travelled to Macclesfield Forest in October in search of the source of the River Bollin. Blessed with perfect weather and armed with clipboards and backpacks containing a fabulous lunch by Mrs Taylor, they set about identifying many geographical sights including valleys, and river features such as meanders, erosion and deposition.

Trip to the Lowry

Having studied Shakespeare and read 'A Midsummer Night's Dream', Forms 5 and 6 went to watch a truly stirring performance of the play at the Lowry in February. They were so inspired that it prompted them to re-write their favourite scene in modern English and perform it in assembly the following week.

In March Forms 5 and 6 had a fantastic five days when they travelled to Saint Omer in Northern France where they stayed at the Chateau d'Ebblinghem. After weeks of diligently practising the necessary vocabulary and grammar, the girls were eagerly awaiting the trip and their preparations certainly paid off.

Accompanied by Mr Reynolds, Madame Ward and Mrs Hughes, the girls had a real experience of life in France. During their stay they shopped at a local market, made crépes and some ate snails, including Miranda in Form 5 who consumed eight of them. The girls visited a paper-making factory and the local aquarium as well as the now mandatory visit to the chocolate making centre. Much French was spoken when the girls visited a local school and enjoyed time learning about life at a French school.

Needless to say they all arrived home thoroughly exhausted but full of exciting stories for their parents.



Form 4's Trip to York

In early March the Form 4 girls were lucky enough to embark on a three day residential trip to York where they stayed at the welcoming Huntington House hostel. The girls have also thrown their all into their performances in School plays, assemblies and concerts. Speech and drama is such an important part of School life at WPS and the girls sat the English Speaking Board exams again this year with LAMDA exams being introduced for the first time.

Wilmslow Prep girls win National Art competition



The School's Form 6 girls took 1st prize in the ISA National Art Competition, competing against 300 schools from across the country. The girls won first place with their range of 'seated figures' in the hotly contested 3D category.

Commenting, Art Teacher, Mrs Fenton said: "The girls have developed their art and craft skills brilliantly in the last few years. Winning a national art competition is the culmination of effort and endeavour and the School is delighted that their hard work has been rewarded. This is a fantastic achievement."

In a reversal of the Noah's Ark story, the infants returned to their classrooms in March...after a great flood was cleared.

During the Christmas holidays a burst pipe caused flooding, and considerable damage, in Cobham Block which houses the School's Kindergarten, Reception class and Forms 1 and 2.

Staff returning to School after the Christmas break were faced with the flood and sprang into action, salvaging what they could from the now out of bounds classrooms and setting up temporary classrooms. Within days the loss adjustor had visited and local tradesmen began work. On March 4th the remedial work was complete and the girls proudly marched back in to their classrooms two by two!

Commenting, Mr Reynolds said:

"Flooding at any time is very disruptive but returning to School in the New Year ready for a new term and to be faced with classrooms knee deep in water was not the start I'd envisaged! Thanks to a formidable team effort we are now back on track and the girls are excited to be settling in to their new (old!) accommodation."

Wilmslow Preparatory School has always been dedicated to raising money for many worthy causes and this year has been no exception.
